Although my children are of mixed race with a different appearance from mine, I feel the soul of their mother's motherland is clearly engraved on their hearts. Whenever my children went through identity confusion and crisis, I was desperate to express how wonderful and special they are. They are the 35th and 36th generation of the Chang family of Indong, Korea. Our Chang family's sole mission is "Hong-Ik," which means " all Koreans shall exist for the good of all mankind." I was desperate to tell them how blessed they are to perform their "hong-ik" in different skin tones and hair colors than their Chang family ancestors. The desperate heart of a mother who cannot express these wonderful values to her children made me feel defeated.







#### OUR HOPE & DESIRE

For Mixed Children: "What Makes Korean" For American Family "Learn About Korea" On April 29, 1992, the Los Angeles riot happened. The riot destroyed nearly all businesses in Koreatown in Los Angeles. In May 2020, another riot broke out across the country after the death of George Floyd. A large number of Korean-American businesses nationwide were looted and burned. Whenever civil disturbances occur, a significant number of Korean businesses are targeted for looting. Aside from the disturbances mentioned above, in other disturbances, especially in Baltimore, about half of the looted businesses were owned by the Korean-Americans. This certainly is evidence of profiling and racial animosity against Korean businesses.

Experts say that the rate of suicide or attempted suicide among Korean–American youth is higher than that of other races. Although this problem is not well addressed, it is a realistic concern that we must face and solve.

Some of our children appear to be embarrassed when their parents come to their school, perhaps because their parents appear foreign or don't communicate well in English. Children of immigrant families often live two different lives with two different languages. At home, they must follow Korean ways of life and Korean values. However, when they are in school, they must quickly change their personality to fit naturally with their friends. Our children can easily get lost inbetween two different cultures.

In our eyes, a mixed Korean appears to be a Westerner. However, in the eyes of Westerners, a mixed Korean may appear to be Asians. You may be welcomed by both sides, but you may find yourself in a precarious position where neither side completely accepts them. There are many children who are hesitant to project their identities with confidence.



## THE BEGINNING IS HALFWAY, ALL IS POSSIBLE

Systematic and realistic cultural sensitivity training is urgently needed. This task is not easy nor there is a one-size-fits-all solution. We must first encourage people in similar situations to talk about each other's experiences and overcome them through voluntary healing. Saimdang Society is not an educational institution capable of training anyone at this time, but we must lay down the blocks to build a training program.

There are about 12 million families who relate to a Korean. They learn to love Korea or Koreans due to their Korean family member(s). They are ready to support and advocate for their Korean family nieces and nephews. We must tell them more about Korean culture.

## SCOPE AND METHOD OF EDUCATION

- Encourage other regional Korean organizations to host more meet-ups
- Training in form of recreation among similar people as themselves
- Invite a Keynote speaker to address the issues.
- Sharing other success stories and experiences. It should be interactive and fun

Our children seem to do well until middle school, but they often start to feel distinction based on race. As they get older, some children even questions, "Why wasn't I born white?"

Instead, wouldn't it be great if they experience, "I am thankful that I am a Korean-American." Our children must feel confident to identify who they are with no hesitation whatsoever. Some say that America is a melting pot but why not a salad bowl? Since we cannot ask others to change their views, we must plant confidence and pride in being uniquely different among other children.

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## **Education Should Be Fun**

What can parents do for their children, who feel inferior because of their ethnicity, yet become the object of jealousy because of their outstanding performances? Teaching the Korean language is important, but we need to spend more time and energy on building confidence, and that starts with an ability to identify oneself. That can be a boring subject and we should make it fun and exciting.

We hope to give our children confidence. We want them to feel proud of being who they are. Wouldn't it be great if their confidence is so high that they feel they can do everything better than others? With that much confidence, we hope to see our children grow up and make our nation greater and help build a better world. Our children will have "hong-ik," that is to say humility and humanity.

The Saimdang Society desires to develop identity through fun-oriented education. Such education should be interesting and motivated to excite our youth.

The Saimdang Society is in an infant stage with limited resources and infrastructure. We don't have trained educators or curricula currently, but as a group of parents and grandparents, we know what is good for our children. Based on our love and devotion, we accomplish our goal of exciting fun-oriented education for developing identity.

The Saimdang Society has no intention of imitating an educational institution. We will be faithful to our role as an organization to lay a foundation for specialists and trained educators to come together to create the best training program that all parents and grandparents desperately want to have for our children. We will not limit our programs to our children exclusively. We will keep our doors wide open for anyone else to join our tiny movement.
